"When we were young there was always someone to help us, someone who had something for us to do. It was Joe Cole (founder of Club 44). Now we help kids find things to

The club finances the charities with one big fund-raiser each year.

sponsor a big motorcycle race. We get right. Safety is the main thing, not speed," motorcyclists from all over the country," Parker said.

Though members don't give riding lessons, they do emphasize safety when taking children for rides or when they see youths riding recklessly.

"When kids get motorcycles, they think the UAW Hall in north St. Louis and then we 'speed is the important thing.' That's not

Parker said.
